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Musée de l'Homme

Inaugurated in June 1938, the Musée de l'Homme presents the evolution of Man and societies, by crossing biological, social and cultural approaches. Located in the Palais de Chaillot, in a building built for the 1937 Universal Exhibition and remodeled in 2015, the Museum brings together in one place collections of prehistory, biological and cultural anthropology, as well as a research, teaching, training and publishing center on the evolution of Man and societies.

The permanent exhibition develops three major themes, from the origins of Humanity to his future: who are we, where do we come from, where are we going? The aim is to understand humans and their place in the living world, to tell the story of their origins and to question our margins of adaptation in tomorrow's world.

The tour is based on priceless collections: fossils of Cro-Magnon men, the Paleolithic statuette known as the "Venus of Lespugue", anatomical waxes... The collections of the Museum of Man are among the most important in the world in the fields of Prehistory and Anthropology.

Picasso and Prehistory (till June 12, 2023)



Conceived as part of the Arts and Prehistory season, the exhibition offers on 240 m², about forty paintings, sculptures, drawings, ceramics and engraved pebbles of Pablo Picasso which are presented in dialogue with prehistoric works and objects from his workshops, exploring the relationship of Picasso to this distant *Woman throwing a stone. La Société des Amis du Musée de l'Homme (SAMH)

The Société des Amis du Musée de l'Homme is an association recognized as being of public utility. Its purpose is to support the work of the Museum's researchers, to enrich its collections, to assist in its activities and, more generally, to contribute to its influence.

The Musée de l'Homme is both a museum that preserves and presents collections to the public and a teaching and research institution on human evolution. The SAMH financially supports the missions and publications of the Museum's researchers. In 2008, the SAMH created the André Leroi-Gourhan Prize, which is awarded each year to a student of the National Museum of Natural History whose work contributes to the scientific and cultural content of the Museum of Man.

As for the enrichment of the collections, the SAMH has recently transmitted to the museum a Boïken dish from New Guinea, a series of Kabyle pottery, a Syrian shepherd's cloak, a collection of Baghouz pottery dating from the Neolithic period, a marotte from Vanuatu and four rattan objects from Sepik (New Guinea).

It co-produces with the Museum nearly twenty conferences per year and regularly organizes them in its regional branches, in Marseille and Nantes/Pornic.

Musée d'Orsay

The museum, which houses collections from the period 1848-1914, reflects the diversity of artistic creation in the Western world during this period. This interdisciplinary museum brings together collections of painting, sculpture, architecture, graphic arts (drawing, prints), decorative arts (objects and furniture), photography, about 6,000 works (not including photographs and drawings). Partie de bateau or Canotier au chapeau haut de forme painted by Gustave Caillebotte between 1877 and 1878 has just joined the Musée d'Orsay collections. A major work by the artist, but also, by its subject, its workmanship and its history, of the Impressionist movement, it was classified as a national treasure in 2020 by the Ministry of Culture. These collections are complemented by a rich program of conferences, concerts and temporary exhibitions.

The temporary exhibitions

Manet / Degas (till July 23, 2023)

This exhibition, which brings together the two painters Édouard Manet (1832-1883) and Edgar Degas (1834-1917) in the light of their contrasts, forces us to take a new look at their real complicity. It shows the heterogeneous and conflicting nature of pictorial modernity and reveals the value of Degas's collection, where Manet took a larger place after his death.

This spring 2023, the Musée d'Orsay will be exhibiting around one hundred pastels from its collection of approximately 500 works. The last exhibition of this scale devoted to the museum's pastels, "Mystery and Radiance", dates from 2009. This new presentation will allow the public to discover or rediscover these jewels of the collection where works by Millet, Degas, Manet, Cassatt, Redon, Lévy-Dhurmer and many others shine.

La Société des Amis des musées d'Orsay et de l'Orangerie (SAMO)

Founded in 1980, the SAMO is an association of public utility that supports the promotion of these two museums as well as the development of their activities. In particular, the SAMO participates in new acquisitions and allows donations of works to the museums. More than 2000 paintings, sculptures, drawings, photographs, furniture and objets d'art joined the collections of the Musée d'Orsay in 40 years, thanks to its intervention. This community of passionate people has made visible and accessible an exceptional heritage that had previously remained private. The Friends of the Musée d'Orsay and the Musée de l'Orangerie contribute to making our two museums resolutely living institutions and work hand in hand with their teams.

In April 2020, SAMO created the Fondation des Amis pour le rayonnement des musées d'Orsay et de l'Orangerie (FARMO), which is housed at the Fondation de France and whose mission is to support projects of general interest in favor of research, education and cultural democratization of these two museums. Its projects are focused on the transmission and sharing of art and culture with all publics.
